In Memoriam



Mary, his wife, **KCWT**, and the turning world lost a legend in July. **Bob Davis** died. He is survived by his wife, Mary Davis, youngest daughter, Laurie Moone, (Richard), son-in-law, Ben Christy, four grandsons and one great-grandson. He also leaves many friends and admirers of his work.

Bob was predeceased by his brother, Edward (Marcine) Davis, his oldest daughter, Susan Christy, and his son, Rob Davis.

While he made many things out of wood, starting with furniture, he made clocks, bowls, and platters: he is probably best known for his miniatures and his Christmas ornaments - which his wife Mary decorated. Regarding the Christmas ornaments, he said "I just turn what Mary says she wants."

Bob was born in 1925 and grew up in Atlanta, Georgia. He was 92 years old and was married for 72 years to his high school sweetheart, Mary Chapman. Together they raised three children. Bob served in both WWII and Korea as a Naval officer.

In retirement, Bob and Mary moved to Prairie Village, Kansas to be near their youngest daughter and to passionately pursue their hobbies. Bob was an avid woodworker and an even more avid woodturner.

Per Bob's wishes, no services will be held. He donated his body to medical research at KU Medical School in honor of his son, Rob, who died during his third year of medical school in 1977.


Dear Jerry,

Meeting



The demonstration this month was provided by **Ed Jasczrak** who showed how he makes the cuts for his Irish knot designs. He also made up a number of examples of The design using different angles of cutting.




The basic thrust of the demonstration was to show how he makes the cuts and glues up the blanks to make the items shown above. "Once you start cutting you have to make sure that what you cut out, you have to put back in." If you are going to take out a quarter inch piece in, you have to put back in a quarter inch piece or the lines won't match up.




Before you make additional cuts in a blank, you have to be very sure that the glue is dry. Otherwise you risk moving parts of the blanks. He uses Titebond II - "It holds well and there is good working time." When he glues up a piece he clamps it to a piece of corian which is at the edge of his bench and this holds really well.




If you are making something four sided, "It must be square or things just won't line up." If there are more than four sides, all the sides need to be equal. He uses a thickness sander to get the elements to be equal and smooth. "It's a planer but it uses sandpaper." He can sand a piece up to 32" wide. He tends to use 120 grit as it leaves a bit of a rough surface which helps the glue to bond really well.



He actually got started with the Irish Fest a number of years ago. He actually died wood - green - and made bottle stoppers and they went over really well. He has branched out to a whole lot of new shapes now. He sees the four sides as being relatively easy but he thinks "What can I do that I haven't done before" which led to the 6 sides and 8 sides.



The bigger the angle of the cut the larger the design will be. (4). Plan the cuts out and it really is just a progression of cutting gluing, drying, cutting gluing... etc. (1) You can make a lot of cuts (2) and can actually overdo the design (3). If you are going to make a number of the same design, use a stop on the saw so that everything lines up for every cut.

There were two challenges this month - inlay and hollowing - based on the last two demonstrations. Hopefully, all those who took the CNC'd medallions are playing them and bringing them back for the Irish Fest.



KC Symposium in Review

What follows is a series of excerpts from an article by Chuck Gies, featured in the [North Coast Woodturners](#) newsletter, August 2017.

"This year in Kansas City, things were a little more compact than they had been in Atlanta. The distance from the hotel to the convention center was about the same, but it was mostly outdoors and eliminated a lot of the ups and downs that were necessary in Atlanta. The demos had a good deal of variety; everything from turning demos, to panel discussions, to critiques. The demos...seemed to suit my interests [better] than what I [experienced] in Atlanta. As always, some of the finest professional turners were giving demos...Now after attending at least five symposiums, this was the best one yet. There is always some type of improvement from year to year, and this year was no different. The biggest [enhancement]... was the video operation for each of the sessions... AAW is putting some real attention into getting their video set up right... [There is an] awful lot to see and do in a very short time. It can really revive your interest in turning, even if it was on life support...Think about it. You have some time. 2018 is Portland, OR, [Thursday, June 14, through Sunday, June 17, 2018.]"
