KCWT Year-End Review Kris Coyan – President

Another productive year has passed for the Kansas City Woodturners Association, and I am pleased to share a summary of our 2025 activities and accomplishments.

Programming & Demonstrations

We hosted numerous open shop opportunities and eleven high-quality demonstrations throughout the year. Winter programs featured photography techniques for woodturners (Kurtis Cowman and Kevin Neeley) and a wood-stabilization session by Bill Paullo. Seasonal challenges encouraged members to explore new techniques, refine their turning skills, and showcase their work.

Spring demonstrations included a Top Roulette game, an impromptu second-turning of a bowl session by Kris Coyan, and Mike McReynolds' "Turning a Bowl on the Bias."

Summer highlights featured Gary Mundhenke's rotary CNC demo, Jim Garner's woven basket texturing techniques, and Don Frank's "Turning Outside the Box."

Fall programs included an ornamental birdhouse demonstration by Larry Randolph and a presentation on Green Wood Turning by Phill Sikes.

Winter concluded with an "Emerging Bowl and Sphere" demonstration by Brian Bartelli.

Club Projects & Special Events

February's Bowl-a-Palooza saw members roughing and preparing about 60 green Silver Maple bowl blanks, all contributing to future fundraising efforts.

In May, the club produced nearly 60 engraved police batons for the KCKPD. With coordination by Mike Thomas and production support from Gary Mundhenke, this project resulted in a generous \$5,000 donation. KCWT is now the official baton provider for the department.

Our annual KCWT Picnic at Shawnee Mission Park drew strong participation, great food, and excellent weather. Later in the year, members gathered for a couple Top Turning Saturdays to support sales events and the Santa's Workshop program.

Community Outreach & Sales

This year included extensive outreach, with club tents at First Fridays (April–October) and additional events such as the Lake Quivira Bazaar, Lenexa Spinach Festival, Bingham-Wagner Antique & Crafts Show, and Kaw Valley Farm Tour. These events supported both club fundraising and member sales while helping us connect with prospective new members. Special thanks to Ed Jaszczak for leading setup, sales/recruitment, and teardown at every First Friday event.

We also assisted in the sale of woodworking tools belonging to late member Tony Giordano, coordinated by Anthony Harris and Kevin Neeley, providing meaningful support to his family.

The club once again joined the KC Irish Festival, with many members donating their time. The event continues to be one of our best opportunities for public visibility and gross sales.

At this year's Santa's Workshop with the Woodworkers Guild, more than 530 wooden trucks were built by children and paired with KCWT spinning tops. The event brought in many visitors and plenty of smiles.
