The January Meeting

Last Meeting

Our new Vice President, Roger Sheperd, presided over the December meeting. We didn't have a featured speaker at this meeting so Roger led a discussion on annual dues, as mention earlier. Paul, Manager of the Woodcraft Store, addressed the meeting and reassured the KC Woodturners that the Woodcraft Store is glad to have our monthly meetings in the store for the forseeable future. We all thanked Paul and will continue to favor Woodcraft with our business and good will as we have in the past. Other meeting business included a discussion on what future demonstrations or discussions the members would like to see. Topics requested were "how to safely heat a shop" and "shop dust control".

The December meeting's "show and tell" had quite a few great projects. Duton Biggs brought his completed Noah's Arc segmented bowl, a very unique and ingenious creation. George Sharrar brought a couple of new bowls, including an outstanding compound- mitered osage orange bowl. Kevin Neelley brought a black palm wood bowl, utilizing both edge and end grain. Earl Reed brought a newly-completed bowl that he says is a refinement of the bowls he showed at the November meeting. The new bowl's lines show Earl has a good eye for proportion. Roger Fisher brought a fine new bowl. One thing I noticed - Roger has a personal signature disk attached to the bottom of his bowls - maybe he could tell us where he gets them. John Winfiel brought a number of projects in progress to show: a feather plaque, an intricate music box and a bowl with top having a metal hinged lip. John sure has some varied projects cooking. John Larson showed the waffle iron handles he is making with his duplicator lathe. John might be demonstrating a Vega Duplicator Lathe at the Woodworker's Show at the Merchandise Mart on February 10th or thereabouts. Roger Sheperd brought Christmas tree ornaments to show. He makes them from very light weight wood (no need to hollow them) and paints them with enamel paint. Chris Kunzle brought wooden tops with inserted small felt-tip pens. The pens draw circular designs when the tops are spun. Kids really ought to love these toy tops.


