He has a Powermatic 90 lathe, to which he has made many modifications. Chris has made reproduction Queen Ann and Louis XIV furniture. His other hobbies include sports and classical music and he would like to learn more about metal turning, milling and toolmaking.

John Larson has been a woodturner for 8 professional vears and has been а woodturner for about a year. He lives in Shawnee, KS, and works out of his house. manufacturing handles and doing restoration work for house and antique restorers. For all you recent KC Woodturners members, John started the Kansas City Woodturners and was its first President. John is a member of The National Trust for Historic Preservation. His other interests include beekeeping (with excellent honey), hunting and camping. He turns on a Record CL3-48 lathe, a Hapfo Duplicator Calipe Hydraulic and a Duplicator lathe. John is interested in trying out different types of wood finishes and he also likes reading design books and magazines.

Woodcraft Turning Demos

Last Meeting

The October meeting was held at Paxton Fine Woods. The evening's first speaker was Paxton's **Rick Farrell**. Rick talked for a few minutes about his beautiful woods for sale. He also mentioned that the KC Woodturners will receive a 10% discount at the Paxton store. During the meeting's break, Rick opened up the store to us for an evening sale at a special extra discount. Thanks Rick!

The October meeting's second speaker was **Duffy Edwards** of Duffy's Studio. Duffy is a professional jeweler who talked about wood lathe projects using mixed media, such as stone, gallery wire and gold foil. Duffy has been soldering the silver gallery wire rings that decorate some of Chuck Carnahan's bowls and offered his services to the rest of us. He passed on a number of good tips on adhesive selection and the use of gold foil.

New Member

A new member signed up at the October meeting: **Les Malone.** The Kansas City Woodturners welcome you. If you have any questions...just ask. There is something to be learned at every meeting. Almost everyone in this group are amateur woodturners with a wide variety of experience and interest. Be sure to look over our video collection. There are instructional videos for every experience level.

Show and Tell

The October meeting's challenge was something long and thin. Boyko Varney's tall and thin vase was the closest anyone came to meeting the challenge.

Russ Blaser showed off a nice laminated bowl made with walnut and maple panels, using highlighting veneers. Russ had spent an afternoon in Kevin Neelley's studio (a one-car garage is a shop but a two-car garage is a studio) learning how to make this kind of bowl. Russ is a good student. He also brought an exotic redwood burl vase that he had given up on after it had blown apart on the lathe. Russ repaired and accentuated the breaks using Chuck Carnahan's turquoise inlay method. Russ says that he always uses his Air-Mate face mask/air purifier when lathing.

Chuck Carnahan brought an interestinglyshaped vase made from grasstree root. Grasstree root is a woody root in the lily family and not really a tree. Chuck decorated the vase with turquoise inlay. He finished the vase using Behlen's Jet Spray sanding sealer and lacquer, followed by buffing and Renaissance Wax. Chuck also showed off a good-looking maple burl cap bowl with malachite inlay.

George Sharrar instructed us on how he made his unique vases with his indexing jig. Last meeting, George had showed the laminated block that he cut the vases from. This meeting, he showed the different ways

veneers can be used to create different effects in this vase design.

John Larson displayed a rosette he had made for restoration work he was performing at one of the Truman historical houses. Originally, John had Laller Gear make a rosette-cutter for use in a drill press, but technical problems caused him to make all the rosettes on his lathe. Other restoration turning work has prompted John to extend his Record lathe bed to 12 feet long.

Boyko Varney brought two vases, both made using the two-piece method. One was a tall and thin vase with a leather insert. The other was a beautiful spalted birch vase. Varney also showed off an inlay sampler bowl. This bowl contained every kind of stone or metal inlay that he could find, including brass key-machine shavings. The bottom of this sampler bowl was the inlay key, with samples and name of each inlay used.

Rick Farrell brought a banksia pod that also used stone inlay. He showed off some miniature ivory-substitute bowls and vases made from different species of exotic nuts like betel and ivory nut palm. Rick also said that Paxton stocks most of these types of nuts.
