The June Meeting

The topic of June's meeting will be woodshop safety equipment. Our vice president, **Boyko Varney** asks that all members bring their personal safety equipment to the next meeting, including face shields, breathing apparatus and heating protection. Varney hopes to get a good cross section of the safety equipment that's available.

Our treasurer, **Russ Blaser**, is accumulating another \$1000 order with Craft Supply of Provo, Utah. Craft Supply gives a very good discount to some of the items, such as glue and lathe tools, 25% off on Sorby tools, and almost zero discount to other items. Russ has accumulated \$700 so far. We are going to have two raffles at the June meeting. The first one will be a \$1 raffle for a \$25 gift certificate from Craft Supply. Last Meeting

The May meeting featured KC Woodturner **Dan Bryan**, who showed samples of his turnings and demonstrate how he makes small and miniature turnings. Dan sells his turnings on the Internet at http://www.woodturning.com.

Show and Tell

We had a really good turnout at this meeting. Some excellent turnings were made during the last month. I think we have some of the best amateur turners in the country.

Russ Blaser found an excellent block of elm to turn into a really great "John Jordan" style hollow turning. The wood had striking natural green streaking.

Ron McCreash brought some interesting African spears that he bought in a garage sale. One spear had a turned ebony shaft and the other was turned from mahogany. He also brought a well-designed exotic-looking choc-ta-vega platter that he recently made. Ron made the decision to leave the platter's underside as natural wood. He displayed the platter on a mirror to highlight the underside. Good decision, Ron

Rodger Lambie showed off two new projects. The first was an ash and maple "John Jordan" style vase. The second was a really nice and very large ash bowl. Rod is getting good at big bowls. The bowl started out as a 120 lb. hunk of wood.

Chris Kunzle also brought several projects. The first was a tall open vase with a naturally wavy top. The second was a large bowl made from spalted sycamore. Chris said he used a quart of Deft and some duct tape to strengthen the end grain. The final bowl was one Chris had displayed at the Crown Center show. It was made by gluing 1200 small wood pieces to a sacrificial bowl, filling the spaces between the pieces with green, translucent acrylic, then lathing away the sacrificial bowl. Good job, Chris.

John Shackelford displayed a very unique and nicely-designed project. John called it a "temple jar" made from green live oak. The live oak was very different from the oak we generally see around here.

Dennis Liggett brought a box full of his beautiful laminated, spiral-stemmed goblets made from many different woods. He said that he's made about 30 goblets by now. Dennis also brought the self-centering aircraft drill bit he uses in their manufacture. Dennis also brought a nice maple platter that contained about 2 ounces of lapis inlay.

Sonny Sharrar showed off an ornate chalice and an ingenious nested cup. The nested cup was made using a sacrificial outer cup that was cut away in a pattern to reveal the inner cup. Good technique, Sonny.

Anthony Harris brought two new pieces. The first was a small oak bowl. The second was a nice large cup with 12 captive rings on its stem. Anthony was trying for 13 rings but one broke.

Dan Bryan also brought several pieces to show off. The first was a good-looking box elder bowl that had beautiful natural red streaking. The second was a nicely-designed osage orange bowl. The third was set of similar small natural-edged apple bowls.

Boyko Varney displayed another of his intricate ornamental lathe creations. This one was a lidded box made from ebony, redheart, vera wood and holly. This box featured a basket-weave design.
