The pieces were critiqued by three art professionals along with well over 100 other entries from four States. Chip's piece titled *Natures Edge* was a big leaf maple burl satellite bowl. Kent's piece, also a satellite bowl, turned from end grain mistletoe mesquite was titled *Sunburst*. Kent also received an Honorable Mention for a lidded hollow form entered.

Chip and Kent's pieces will be on display at The Albrecht-Kemper Museum of Art in St. Joseph, MO through February 17, 2008.
