### Demonstration




The demonstration this month was provided by **Tom Boley** who is the president of the Flint Hills Woodturners which is located in Wamego, Kansas. He has participated in a number of our meetings as a visitor and once as a weekend demonstrator. He's become a good friend and this night he told us how he does his log bowl.





Tom began by talking about safety, using a shield and he also uses a glove on his left hand to protect his hand from hot shavings and what he is turning. He realizes that some don't see it as safe but we already need to be careful and he sees it as a valuable protection. He started by setting up the log perpendicular to the bed and between centers. The first thing he did was to turn a tenon on one side and then attach it to a chuck. Rounding out the log is done next and it is important to keep the handle of the tool way down so that the wood is striking the gouge at about a 45 degree angle.










After the ends are rounded the way you want them to be, the interior can be cleaned out. The log is longer than it is wide so when it is spinning on the lathe the cut is actually going outside of the log on the sides. Stop the lathe and check quite often so that the cuts don't go too far. Also, angle the tool such that you are undercutting the ends of the bowl. Doing basic bowl cut.



Make sure that you don't go too deep as the bottom will be concaved a bit and you don't want a funnel. "You are woodturning from the time you pick up the tool until you put it back down again." Pay attention to everything that you are doing. When you are satisfied with the inside of the bowl, then take it off the chuck, reverse turn it and finish off the bottom. One of the suggestions he made about the bark is to soak the edges inside and out with thin CA. Refrain from getting the glue on the face of the bark. He also said that the challenge for the month of September is to make a log bowl

### The Challenge

The challenge this month was to make something that was hollowed from the bottom. This was based on last month's demonstration by **Kris Coyan**

**Mike Erickson** bought a segmented vase he turned with **Kevin Neelley's** assistance. He also brought a cedar lidded bowl (got the wood from **Don Grimes**) he is still working on. He plans to give the lidded bowl to the Beads of Courage community activity of the AAW Symposium here in KC next year. **Mike McReynolds** is president of the Independence turners and their challenge was to make anything out of one piece of wood but nothing other than that piece of wood can be used. It is a two part hollowing and he had to hide the ring so he used some shavings, cut some grooves, and filled them with the shavings. Joint hidden.



**Howard Russell** needed some new tool handles and he had some bubinga he got from the Grizzley scratch and dent sale in Springfield. "If you haven't been there, you just need to go." Check their website. The ferrel is a 1" copper pipe coupling. **Rick Bywater** brought in three bowls, "Yes they were cored." and they are spalted hackberry and finished with walnut oil. He typically does a concave bottom but got to aggressive so when he reversed it he turned a ring instead. **Kent Townsend** brought a piece of maple back from Utah this year and it was setting there in the shop. He was looking for something to do and started on the bowl was having so much fun "It got a little thin." His wife wanted a dobo (used to make bread) and he had this piece of pine. He had to leave the knobs on it as that was the only way his wife would take it. Finished with Walnut.



Taking his wife to an art fair lead him to make this piece because it was cheaper than buying it. **Stuart Shanker** made this and then discovered that the artist he was imitating had a video on YouTube showing how he made them. One of the things that Stuart did was that he burned the bottom with a propane torch. He used Deft spray lacquer to finish the piece. **Chuck Levenson** started to get into the spirit of a coming season by making a candle holder and "nothing says Christmas like space invasion" so he made a flying saucer with three green landing gear. **David Stalling** said that his wife really liked the blue glass and wanted something to hold it. So...he made the inside-out turning. The original glass vase got stuck and ended up in a couple pieces so he found another glass and made the holder a little looser. He has more glass so we may see a few more of these pieces. 

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
