








Dave Bartlett was able to pick up his new phone at the show. He said that it works best in the john.

# Artisans at the Gardens



## Overland Park Arboretum & Botanical Gardens 8909 W. 179th Street Overland Park, KS 66013

It is quite aq bit of work to setup, stay, and tear down and bring things bak to KCWT but **Ann Mellina** (she's the one in the middle) and **Mike Thomas** have done it for a couple years. Jack Karstens came by to make sure they were having fun.

The top Guys: Shaun McMahon, Mike Erickson, Phil Royer, Dave Burks, Larry Dice, Anthony Harris, and Master Top Maker Jerry Darter presented this months demonstration on top turning..







The Top Guys have become sort of a more formalized part of KCWT during the past years. They spend their own money to buy the materials for their tops most of which are donated to tThe Ronald McDonals Houses of KCMO. **Jerry Darter** started off the demo by explaining how he makes his blanks. He generally uses 2X2" maple wood to cut the discs and a birch dowel. He inserts the dowel with a drill and connects the two using TiteBond type 1 or 2 glue. Epoxy will work well too but CA becomes/is brittle and won't last as long. Jerry is the one who comes up with lots of ideas as to the kinds of tops to make and challenges everyone to grow. The flying top was his idea.







**Phil Royer** has as genius for texturing and decoration. He started using the Sorby texturing tool but found that it wouldn't get close enough to the spindle for what he wanted to do. So...he made his own with a piece of steel, a bushing, and a Sorby texturing disc. Phil related that the benefits of turning tops extends beyond that activity. "Once you have turned a couple hundred tops, turning a finial is pretty easy." There are other benefits as well: "The cleanup isn't that bad and if it comes off the lathe while turning, generally doesn't do any damage."

Many of the group use the Tombow pens for the coloring. Phil has access to other different kinds of pens via his wife (and her hobby) and will use whatever works. There is a difference between the water base pens and the alcohol based ones. Experimenting is helpful.





The Tippie Top is a bit like the bumble bee- it isn't suppose to fly but it does. **Anthony Harris** is trying to get the physics and design down by turning a lot of them. The wood, the density, the shape, the size of the spindle, what it is spun on, and how it is spun all seem to be variables. It is amazing that the top works but it does and it is amazing. Some believe that the top of the body needs to be hollowed in order to work (Jerry Darter) but Anthony clearly has them working without hollowing them. The fun is in trying to figure out how to turn them so that most of them work all the time. That is the real challenge.



One of the questions people ask is why we don't just turn from a solid billet of wood. **Shaun McMahon** cut two billets each 3.5X4" From one he turned a top. The other one he sliced up so that 8 top blanks could be made. If the tops were turned from single billets it would cost significantly more to make each top.




Each top guy seems to have a style all their own and they keep experimenting with design and decorating ideas It is, truly, a fun activity.




**Kevin Turk:** a Geni bottle stimulated by Kevin Neelley's turnings. Made some gigs and got some help from Kevin. He experienced some problems with this one and it broke a couple times toward the bottom. Remade three rings on the bottom and was able to finish it. Oak, rosewood, ipe, and finished with Hampshire sheen. He also put a penny in the bottom. **Rick Bywater:** his second attempt at a shuttle cock. One piece of silver maple. Did an eggshell on the bottom. Used milk paint over the woodburning on the feathers. The vase is from an ornamental Japanese Cherry burl. He filled the voids with resins; white, blue, and black. He likes the surprise when turning resin as you just never know what it is going to be like.





**Tony Giordano:** he's spent time turning the scraps that he had laying around. He's been making little things. He made two bottle stoppers using the Ruth Niles materials and then made a bottle opener using one of her kits as well. The opener is finished with epoxy and the other two are finished with beeswax and buffed. **Kris Coyan:** brought a twice turned walnut bowl. He left a band around it so that he could do some carving using the techniques demonstrated by Sue Bergstrand in her demo. He used a Dremel tool and some carving tools to make the design.






**Efi Kamara:** This vessel was inspired by Kevin Neelley's peacock vase. He used segmented pieces of diamond wood. He intends to make another one with two rings. The piece is made from pine he got from his neighbor. **Charles Levenson:** his daughter got into cold brewed coffee and he figured that this was the perfect Rube Goldberg type coffee grinder. He used a piece of monkey pod to make the drawer.





**Anthony Harris:** brought in a banksia pod box with a threaded lid. He has made a number over that past few years and they are fun as they are always different. Finished with shellac and then buffed using the Beall buffing system. **Ann Mellina:** has been experimenting with the laser engraver at the JOCO Public Library. She turned a couple plates and laser engraved the designs on them





**David Stalling:** This piece is from his spalted Oak pile. It is also an example of a piece of wood that is somewhat misshapen. There was a hole in it as well. He filled the hole with resin and finished the piece with tung oil. **Kevin Elge**: he is a visitor from Nebraska - Great Planes Woodturners. He was here visiting his son. The spoons are turned two at a time. The bowls are twice turned. He turns green wood, steams the turnings, and doesn't get very many cracks. He blends his own finish.

Dimensions: 14" wide X 4" diameter (6" tall in stand)

Description: This is a Cryptex secret box as seen in the movie The DaVinci Code with Tom Hanks. Mike has made a number of these secret boxes. "This is the most complicated one I have see, with 14 roasting key rings." A couple years ago, Mike demonstrated making these at a KC Woodturners monthly meeting. The secret code for this Cryptex will be given to the sinner of the auction. The Cryptex is made from ash and finished with poly. The stand is walnut.
