

With the good fortune of an unexpected roof over his head he began his college education. Dale always expressed gratitude to the Beta house which he credited with getting him through his undergraduate classes and putting him on the path to becoming a doctor.

After collage he married Pam Barron, former KU cheerleader and the ultimate love of his life.

Dale enlisted in the Navy and became a flight surgeon where, among other things, he got to fly in jets launched from aircraft carriers! After the military he studied orthopedic surgery at Baylor College of Medicine.
